CONSERVATION EDUCATION by Educator Jared Moloshok

While bushfires in Australia are an annual event, since June 2019 there have been an unusually large number of fires along the eastern and southern parts of the continent. Thought to have been extended in part by the effects of climate change, the fires have destroyed over 72,000 square miles of land, and claimed the lives of 34 people and up to 1.25 billion animals – experts fear that the fires may drive some endangered species to extinction. More ominously still, plumes of black carbon produced by the blazes have spread over 7000 miles across the Pacific, reaching countries like New Zealand, Chile, and Argentina. As black carbon is both hazardous to human health and a major cause of climate change, the fires in Australia are now having an effect that extends well beyond the continent.

In response, hundreds of relief efforts have sprung up, including the Zoological Society of New Jersey and Essex County Turtle Back Zoo. While this crisis is ongoing, any donations made to these organizations could help to mitigate the fires' devastation. In addition, any of the everyday methods used to combat climate change, such as mindful energy usage, calculating one's ca<u>rbon</u> footprint, even planting or additional trees, could be helpful for diminishing some of the effects of this disaster and others like it.

Mrs. Claus shared her favorite stories about NJ-native wildlife with all the good families who came to the zoo. Sea lions normally live into their teens, but under human care, they often live into their twenties and even thirties!


